## **ICOI Activities: Progress to Date**

### **Update on Qualitative Data Analysis**

In collaboration with our community partners, the ICOI research assistants (collectively) conducted 207 qualitative interviews. In the summer of 2024, five research assistants received training in coding individual interview data using Nvivo. Led by professors Oona St-Amant and Sepali Guruge, our academic partners contributed to the development of the coding scheme. Using the coding scheme, the research assistants coded all translated and transcribed individual interviews by the end of October. Following this, further data analysis has begun at city levels.

The table below illustrates the number of qualitative interviews conducted in each city, categorized by language group.

## **Participant Observation Data Collection**

Research assistants across the ICOI study sites met with professors Oona St-Amant and Sepali Guruge bi-weekly (via Zoom) to learn about how to conduct participant observations. These sessions continued from August until after the participant observation data collection was completed in November.

We are pleased to announce that the participant observation data collection is now complete, and the research assistants are currently finishing their field notes. We will share updates on this in our next newsletter.

#### Phase 2 REB Protocol

In Phase 2, we are aiming to identify and assess intervention strategies to foster social connectedness among immigrant older adults from Arabic, Mandarin, and Punjabi-speaking communities in the nine cities. Professors Souraya Sidani and Sepali Guruge have already conducted a literature search and review to identify evidence-based interventions aimed at promoting social connectedness. Based on the insights gained from this review, they drafted a protocol for this phase of the work, and submitted an application to the Research Ethics Board at Toronto Metropolitan University for approval. The application was shared with City Leads, Provincial Leads, and Research Stream Leads for their feedback.

# Looking Ahead: 2025 ICOI Summit

We are excited to begin planning for the 2025 ICOI Summit, which is scheduled to take place from March 26 to 28 in Montreal, Quebec. The last ICOI summit took place at University of Calgary, Alberta, and was attended in person by 32 ICOI team members, and virtually by 50 team members. We are excited to connect with our academic and community partners again soon. This event will offer a valuable opportunity for collaboration, discussions, sharing progress, and making plans for the remainder of the project.

Stay tuned for more updates on event registration, venue, agenda, and other key information as we finalize plans.






# **Team Member Highlights**



Congratulations to Professor Bharati Sethi, who was a keynote speaker at the Canadian Association on Gerontology 2024 conference held in Edmonton, Alberta. Her keynote presentation was based on over a decade of her research with immigrants, including both formal and informal caregivers, older adults, and Bharathi's own experiences as a racialized immigrant and personal support worker. Immigrants' institutional experiences of racism and migration policies that increase the risk of abuse for migrant workers were highlighted. Bharathi also discussed the impacts of racism on the health and


well-being of personal support workers, organizational productivity, and the overall healthcare system. The inconsistency of educational and professional requirements across Canada was noted as a significant concern for the quality of care provided to aging populations. She emphasized that addressing racism in healthcare is a shared responsibility among academics, governments, organizations, and other stakeholders.



Dr. Sepali Guruge recently published an edited book titled *Intersections of Aging and Immigration: The Promise and Paradox of a Better Life.* In this book, the authors focus on the many barriers faced by older immigrants, as well as their resilience in coping with these. Some of the chapters were co-authored by members of the ICOI team. Details about the book will be shared in the next newsletter .

We are excited to share that Professor John Shields has recently co-authored a book titled *The Canadian Non-profit Sector:*Neoliberalism and the Assault on Community.

The authors discuss the challenges facing the immigrant-serving non-profit sector. Neoliberal restructuring has left individuals and families scrambling for survival, and increasingly, reliant on the under-funded and over-regulated non-profit sector. The book examines the creativity and resilience of nonprofits in maintaining and expanding their services under difficult circumstances. It also delves into the vital role of nonprofits in advocating for human rights, anti-racism, Indigenous claims, migrant rights, and improved health and social services. The authors argue that the over-stretched and under-resourced non-profit sector has been left to address the ever-expanding needs of Canadians amidst growing inequality. The volume applies a critical lens in the analysis of the place of the non-profit

sector organizations, like settlement agencies, in neoliberal times in Canada. The link to the book is below:


