ICOI Summit 2023







ICOI's Year 3 Biennial Project Summit was held in-person at the University of Calgary, Alberta from April 4-6. 32 ICOI team members attended in person, while over 50 others joined virtually via Zoom. We are grateful for the opportunity to connect with and spend productive time together with you.

Some of the key outcomes included: group work and team member input on the qualitative data collection interview guide, as well as what observations could look like in each city and each province; re-commitments from team members towards knowledge mobilization outputs; hearing directly from Community Partners about what they are experiencing in the field with older immigrants; and spending time together as a team – meeting one another and growing a sense of purpose together.

ICOI Activity Updates

Fall 2022 - Summer 2023 Data Collection

The **Older Immigrant Survey** activity (quantitative data collection) was completed this past fall/winter across the 9 participating cities (Montreal, Gatineau, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver, and Victoria). The creation of the survey was led by the Souraya Sidani (Data, Design & Evaluation Committee), Sepali Guruge (Project Director), and the Research Stream Leads: Jill Hanley, Sandeep Agrawal, Zhixi Zhuang, and John Shields. The survey includes measures of social isolation/connectedness and the factors affecting social isolation/connectedness. It was available in 5 languages: Arabic, Mandarin, Punjabi, French and English. Provincial coordinators and research assistants were hired to support City Leads and Co-Leads in completing this work. Over 650 older immigrants (60+) participated, and results are currently being analysed.

The **Older Immigrant Interviews** (qualitative data collection) will begin this summer once approval from the participating university's research ethics boards have been received. Aspects of the Interview Guide were developed with the full team at the ICOI Summit, and finalized by Sepali Guruge (Project Director) and Oona St-Amant (Ontario Provincial Lead and critical ethnography lead for the project). The results of these interviews, upcoming observation, along with the survey results and CLSA data analysis, will inform future project phases.

ICOI Activity Updates (cont.)

CLSA Data Analyses Activity

As of September 2022, the CLSA team, led by Souraya Sidani (Toronto Metropolitan University) and Denise Cloutier (University of Victoria), has completed analysis of the baseline and follow up 1 data obtained in the Canadian Longitudinal **Study on Aging** (CLSA). The data were collected from approximately 7,600 older (55+) immigrants residing in rural and urban regions within seven Canadian provinces. We are in the process of conducting analyses on follow up 2 (6 years following baseline) data. The team examined the influence of different personal, health, social, environmental and immigration-related factors on social isolation, which was represented in levels of loneliness and participation in social and community activities. Two factors consistently influenced levels of loneliness and participation in activities; these were depression and perceived life satisfaction. The results of this project will indicate which of these factors are most influential; they will complement the findings of the Older Immigrant Survey in pinpointing the most important factors for intervention.

Community Partner Survey Report




Last spring, ICOI published a study focused on understanding service providers' views on the risk factors for social isolation among older immigrants, including in the East Asian, South Asian, and Middle-Eastern communities – the

fast-growing immigrant communities in Canada. Service providers employed at the 38 community agencies or organizations that are ICOI partners were asked to complete an online survey. The survey results indicated that challenges in accessing health, social, and settlement services

were considered as very or extremely important to address by 100% of providers working with different older immigrant communities. The survey was conducted during the COVID-19 pandemic, a time of scarcity in healthcare resources and/or increased demand for pandemic-related services. It corroborated other prepandemic studies, which indicated the need for additional healthcare services for older immigrant adults.

2022 Webinar Series

Following the success of the Winter/Spring webinar series, the ICOI's Education & Training Committee, led by Sandeep Agrawal (University of Alberta), organized a



Fall Webinar Series that ran every 2 weeks from September to December 2022. These sessions focused on the Research Stream themes (Social, Economic, Political, and Geo-Spatial Inclusion) and cover a range of topics. This series not only supported the sharing of information across the ICOI team and beyond, but also contributed towards our project knowledge mobilization targets.

2022-2023 Project Reporting

ICOI's Year 3 Annual Contribution Summary was submitted to SSHRC on April 30, 2023, leveraging over 23.7% over years (target is 15% up to this point). This report captures all ICOI partners' contributions (cash and in-kind).

The SSHRC Midterm Report is due this coming October where we will report on all aspects of the project.
